Tavern on the Green was the setting on Monday, September 23, to show fashions from Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden.

To start, there were gorgeous furs from Finland that made women gasp at the thought of wearing them and that made men hold tightly on to their wallets. There were beautiful leather "fun clothes" and wools from Iceland. Sweden showed both stunning evening clothes and comfortable and smart daywear for both men and women. From Norway there were the traditional Norwegian designs as well as sophisticated fashions in sequined fabrics, leathers, and silks. Denmark not only showed magnificent furs, among them a full-length white mink, which must have been coveted by every woman present, but there were practical sports clothes in wool and beautiful knits, as well.

Ten top models, courtesy of Eileen Ford Inc., as well as five other professional models showed the fashions to best possible advantage.

Edda Magnusson wished everyone welcome, and Neel Halpern and Rolf Stang were on the scene again as Masters of Ceremonies. For an hour, their charming repartee and commentary enhanced the show describing no less than 150 items. Among the dignitaries were Mrs. Lennart Bodström, wife of Sweden's foreign

Work by Annika Wallenberg Shown

The American Scandinavian Society kicked off its Fall/Winter Arts Program on October 11 with a showing of collages and sculptures in stoneware by the Swedish artist, Annika Wallenberg.

The selection of artworks will be on view from October 14 through November 8 at the Bjorn Lindgren Gallery, 575 Madison Avenue, New York City.

This exhibition provides the first opportunity for an American audience to see Ms. Wallenberg's mastery in clay; her compositions frequently surprise the viewer with the warm feeling of fabrics instead of the traditional heavy coldness often associated with clay.

Ms. Wallenberg has been acclaimed in Scandinavia for her superior feel for naturalism in her motifs taken from everyday life. Most of her works have been framed in acrylic, and are suitable for hanging.

Gallery hours for the exhibit are 11:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Marianne Juhl Lectured on Karen Blixen

One of the most successful A.S.S. affairs of the past spring season was the lecture given on April 21 by author Marianne Juhl on Karen Blixen, the Danish author who may be better known as Isak Dinesen.

As Rolf Stang has written, Ms. Juhl conveyed Blixen's feeling of triumph following a life of struggle in the sense that in the role of professional writer she did enjoy the satisfaction of seeing her books succeed. The lecturer also pointed out that after losing her beloved farm in Africa, as well as both her marriage and the love that followed it, she returned home to Denmark, whereupon she became - at the age of 45 - one of the world's best short story writers. Of Blixen's writings, Dr. Juhl said: "When a career starts in maturity, there is a looking inward that can be enormously revealing. Especially when the person is as honest as Karen
